Manor High School Sports Centre and Facilities Fund

Manor High School has enviable outdoor sports facilities. They are vast, green and beautifully located. Our sporting ambitions mean that we require a Sports Hall, fit for 21st Century learning. Whilst we have been able to evolve our site to meet the aspirations and needs of our learners, our current gym was built in 1968 and is too small.


Our vision is to create a sporting facility that will benefit the school and community. As well as state of the art multi-court facilities, our proposal includes a fitness suite, dance hall and additional classrooms/meeting rooms. Examples of similar designs can be seen attached. The Sports Centre will be accommodated comfortably within our existing land without compromising our outdoor provision or our neighbours. The additional inside facilities will enhance the extensive outdoor space available to our students and community users.

The Sports Centre will be available to host a number of local sporting groups and clubs who hold regular weekly sessions, and will also available for one off hire. Funding for such projects is not readily available from the Department of Education or local authority, so instead, we will harness the energy and goodwill of our community, parents, governors and alumni.

Our community will help us to realise the vision. Our parental body covers a wide range of professions with many contacts in finance, business and commerce. ADMISSIONS PROCESS

We have been asked repeatedly over recent weeks about applications to Year 7 in 2020 at Manor High, and are happy to clarity the process:

- Applications should be made through your local authority.
- County residents have three choices of secondary school and city residents have four.
- All choices should be used to indicate your preferred schools; it is wise to use all of them so that the choice is not made on your behalf.
- If you wish to apply for more than one Oadby secondary school, you can.
- Your preferences for school will be considered when places are allocated.
- There are no restrictions in regards to the schools you wish to apply for.
- The deadline for applications is Thursday 31st October 2019.

It is essential that you apply for your place by the deadline of 31st October. Late applications receive the lowest priority. Please ensure that you do not miss out.



If you have any queries or have heard differently, please contact us or contact County admissions for further clarification.



'Read for Good' in Full Swing!

Manor High was incredibly fortunate to have an expert storyteller, Amanda Smith, come and visit the school on Friday 27th September to launch 'Read for Good', a national readathon which helps raise money for children hospitals across the UK.

Amanda delivered a personalised

assembly to our Key Stage 3, sharing stories she would typically tell children suffering with a range of illnesses, who are hospitalised and struggling, to give our students an insight into how uplifting and powerful stories can be.



Amanda expressed how appreciative the 'Read for Good' team are with the efforts put in by students and how life-changing the money raised is in making a difference to these children.

Students were informed that the choice of literature was completely in their hands and they were welcome to read a range of texts, from classic novels to crisp packets, as long as they had an agreement with their sponsors as to how much they needed to read in the two





weeks given to raise as much money as possible.

'Read for Good' officially kicked off on Monday 30th September and will end Thursday 10th October, allowing students plenty of time to challenge and motivate themselves to get reading for good.

Whilst visiting Manor, Amanda also ran a workshop with a small group of students, sharing more stories and discussing what students could be reading in their attempt to raise money for 'Read of Good'. One student commented on how "entertaining and witty" the stories being shared were and said they were going to look into being sponsored for reading a 'Fortnite Manual'. Now, Black History Month has expanded to include the history of not just Afro-Caribbean black people but all black people in general.


To celebrate Black History month, our humanities department have created a competition with house points up for grabs. Students have been asked to design an image or piece of art on Black
