This has been another year of strong academic achievement. Excellent outcomes have been secured across our infant, junior and primary schools, alongside very impressive GCSE results at Manor. Sophie shares some of her undertakings this term:

"Since I have started in my role as the sustainability lead for the trust I have kept myself busy. Working alongside the estates manager I surveyed each of the school sites and identified areas which could be planted with additional trees and hedgerows then ordered free plants from the Woodland Trust. Brookside Primary School trees have arrived and I had a lovely morning with the eco-council planting them. Only another 150 to go! The trees for the other school's will be arriving in Spring 2026, so we will have a major planting job on our hands.



Each school has made a commitment to take part in the eco-school green flag award this year. I have met with the eco-leads from are schools and provided guidance on completing the application online as well as sharing some of the activities they could involve their eco-councils with.

One of the main areas I have initially focused on is waste. As a result, I have met with the education officer at our waste company Veolia to determine what support she can give schools, purchased food waste recycling bins for some schools who identified a need and purchased recycling bins for Manor High School.

In November I arranged a visit from a representative of the National Education Nature Park. She spent the afternoon with children from Brookside delivering lessons on outdoor learning, which they loved. After that, she met with all the sustainability leads and demonstrated how the NENP site is used. She has offered to deliver staff meetings in each school and this is something I will be pursuing over the spring term.

In addition, I am working with teaching staff to map out their curriculum and identify areas where a sustainability focus could be incorporated. This will be ongoing in 2026. So, lots has happened, and lots still to do! I am looking forward to much more to come in 2026 and will keep everybody updated!"





Clara's design has been printed and shared as the official OAK Trust Christmas card for 2025.

This term we have continued on our Eco journey with a wide variety of activities including tree and shrub planting near our newly revamped field, workshops to look at diversity and a Christmas Jumper swap to try and stop 'fast fashion.' We have been awarded the Green Flag award with distinction which are very proud of!



We spoke to our children about managing anxiety and worries, that we all experience these at different times and gave strategies to help as needed. We had a Red card to Racism day, where we discussed 'kindness has no colour' which links perfectly to both our values of Kindness and Promoting Equality.

We also took them to Cambridge University for the day, which was fabulous.




